#### Covid-19 affecting football plans- Bhasera

arare City Football Club chief executive
Tafadzwa Bhasera believes the Covid-19
pandemic has affected soccer clubs plans and
may need to revise their targets for the upcoming
season.

Bhasera was speaking ahead of the second resumption of the Chibuku Super Cup end of September.

The Chibuku Super Cup is the precursor to the resumption of the Premier Soccer League which has not been played for nearly two years owing to Covid-19 induced lockdown.

"I think everyone is affected which draws back all the plans that most clubs had. We are looking at targets that were set with regards to the league and other competitions.

Bhasera said players were equally affected by the pandemic.

"Players were frustrated especially when the Chibuku Super Cup was put at hold because everyone was geared to go and showcase their talent.

I know of players who really wanted to showcase their talents to attract foreign teams but that could not happen."

"Our junior policy has not been active for the past two years and none of our players were elevated from the Division One team to the PSL team like we usually do."

Bhasera said some of the players will require psychological therapy to get their minds back to work adding that the club has put up a programme to assist such players.

nvironmental Unit head Mr Lisben Chipfunde believes the city will learn a lot in the forthcoming 26th Conference of Parties on Climate Change which will be held in Glasgow, Scotland.

Zimbabwe is a signatory to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change and will send a delegation comprising officials from the Ministries of Environment and Climate and Tourism and Hospitality, local authorities and other stakeholders.

Mr Chipfunde said Harare stands to benefit from the conference.

"UNFCCC was put in place at the real conference in 1992 purely to address issues to do with climate change that have been happening around the world like cyclones, heatwaves, droughts and global warming."

"Our interest is to start getting involved in issues to do with

climate change so that we start to be visible.

Mr Chipfunde said city buildings should be running on solar energy by now which saves a lot of electricity and significantly reduces uses coal and hydro power to generate power.

Coal is a natural resource that is contributing negatively to issues of climate change.

"We need to capacitate all the departments in understanding issues to do with climate change.

He said the conference will help in creating partnerships and understand issues to do with climate financing.

ouncil schools are decongesting through using idle early childhood classrooms.

The move was done as part of the Covid19 fight.

Acting Education and Social Services head Mrs Shylet Kwembeya confirmed the development and said a pilot project was already done and it proved to be successful. "Covid-19 is here to stay so as council we need to be prepared always. We have a duty to plan forward in terms of expanding the schools, existing infrastructure and constructing new schools.

"Council approved a repairing model after noticing that Early Childhood Development Schools (ECDs) are under enrolled resulting in them becoming white elephants while on the other hand some schools are over enrolled."

"We have come up with a model where we are saying the nearest primary school will decongest and take the idle ECD A and ECD B space.

The primary project was implemented at Fundo Council Primary School which is near Dzivarasekwa Day Care Center, the project was implemented in 2019 and it became operational in January 2020.

She said the model proved to be very successful made and an assessment was done through focus group discussions and stakeholders interviews.

Lytton Primary will pair with Kambuzuma 4 Day Care Centre while Kuwadzana 5 Primary School will marry with Kuwadzana 4 Day Care Centre.

Ms Kwembeya added that all council schools reported smooth flow of business after the resumption of schools after a lengthy break due to a surge in Covid-19 cases during the past winter season.

"They are all in operation as from the 30th of August beginning with the candidate classes and all heads have reported that they opened well.

"In terms of preparedness our major concern is running water, and we have asked the heads to inquire about water status at council schools and we are happy that every school has running water and some have reservoirs like tanks on their premises," she said.

She said council was in the process of acquiring extra sanitizers for the schools.

"We rely on the schools because the School Development Committee (SDC) through the levy's they also do the procurement of PPE at the respective schools so we are saying as council we are doing our part and parents through the SDC committee are doing their part."

Cllr Mhetu said water provision boosts the country's economic and development prospects.

"The provision of water is an integral part of our strategy to ensure economic development and poverty eradication," he said.

He said the city is investing heavily in the rehabilitation of water and waste water infrastructure to allow for effectiveness in addressing water supply and quality.

"To date, significant works have been done on pumps, reservoirs and reticulation infrastructure using funds from development partners as well as devolution funds.

"However, despite our good intentions and hard work as Harare, many of our people still find themselves without clean drinking water and thus resorting to boreholes and open wells.

"We fully understand their frustrations as they grapple with water shortages and more needs to be done as demand continues to rise with the growth in population," he said.

### Minister hails city-ZRP partership

ocal Government Public Works and National Housing Minister July Moyo has praised the partnership between City of Harare Traffic Section and Zimbabwe Republic Police (ZRP) in managing traffic flows in the city.

The volume of traffic in the city's roads has increased over the years to about 1,5 million vehicles plying the CBD according to statistics from the Central Vehicle Registry.

The Minister was speaking during the launch of a programme to train municipal officers as they assume a much bigger policing role.

The training will be done by ZRP.

"The third aspect is on enforcement, where we rely on combined efforts from ZRP and Municipal police.

"The joint operation between ZRP and Harare City Council in the recent past, saw the impounding of 3209 vehicles and a total of 1001 vehicles were towed away to a secure compound, 4572 vendors and 557 touts were arrested.

"Allow me ladies and gentlemen to applaud the good work by both the ZRP and Harare City council," he said.

He said Government has approved a manpower recruitment in the traffic enforcement section from the current 271 to 1139.

"Traffic Enforcement also needs to be resourced in terms of tow vehicles, motor cycles and heavy duty tow vehicles.

"The Ministry of Local Government and Public Works has seen it fit to disburse \$55 million dollars towards resource mobilization," he said.

He urged the traffic officers to adhere to strict discipline and shun corruption.

"It is key that you master the discipline involved to carry out their duties as well as shunning corruption.

"Corruption is a cancer that has crippled many economies and as such it must be condemned and discouraged at all times and places.

"You are our foot soldiers and we expect the best from you," he said.
